and Predicates) • Practice 1

Simple Subjects and Predicates The *simple subject* is the essential noun, pronoun, or group of words acting as a noun that cannot be left out of the complete subject. The *simple predicate* is the essential verb or verb phrase that cannot be left out of the complete predicate. A word that interrupts the verb phrase is not part of the simple predicate. In the chart below, the simple subjects are underlined once and the simple predicates are underlined twice.

Complete Subjects	Complete Predicates
Looking worried, Tom	tried the phone call again.
Most of us	thought the movie was boring.
Many <u>citizens</u> in this country	do not vote.
Sherry	called.

Exercise 1 Recognizing Simple Subjects and Predicates. Draw a line between the complete subject and complete predicate in each sentence. Then, underline each simple subject once and predicate twice.
